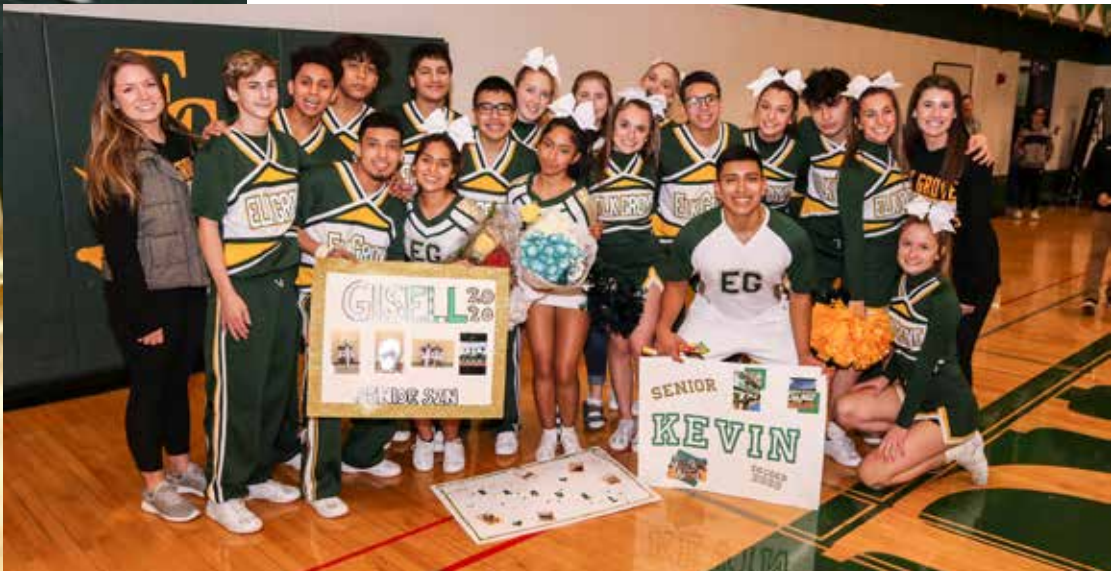

From the School Nurse.....Laura Yamate

Dear Elk Grove High School Students and Families:



My name is Laura Yamate and I am the Certified School Nurse for Elk Grove High School. I have six years of nursing experience - with five of those years spent working as a nurse in the school environment. This will be my second year at Elk Grove High School. I am very proud and excited to be part of, and serve, the EGHS community. If there is anything that I can do to assist you or your student, or if you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact me at 847-718-4473. If you need to fax any forms or paperwork to me, please fax these items to the Health Office at 847-718-4562. I have listed some reminders below regarding important Health Services guidelines.

UPDATING PHONE NUMBERS:

Please remember to call the attendance office to report any phone number changes. It is very important that we have updated and accurate information in case of an emergency. Students that need to go home due to illness or injury will not be excused without permission from a parent/guardian or emergency contact.

ILL/INJURED STUDENTS:

Important Reminder - Keeping students who are ill in the health office for long periods of time poses a health risk to other students and staff members who may need to utilize the health office during the school day. For this reason, we kindly ask that you please have at least one person listed as an emergency contact who is available during the day to pick up your child within a reasonable amount of time should it become necessary. Additionally, keeping students in the health office for long periods of time who are injured may pose a health risk to the injured student as they may be exposed to illnesses from other students and staff members utilizing the health office. For this reason, we again ask that you please have at least one person listed as an emergency contact who is available during the day to pick up your child within a reasonable amount of time should it become necessary. We greatly appreciate your understanding and cooperation.

VISITS TO THE NURSE:

Any students coming to the nurse must have a pass from their current class. If it is a passing period, the student needs to get a pass from the class they will be starting. The only exceptions are when a situation is emergent (bleeding, feeling lightheaded, etc.) or during lunch. It is the nurse's discretion whether to allow a student to rest in the health office during a class period. Many things are considered (reason for request, grades, attendance, previous visits to the nurse, etc.). One of our goals of the health office is to treat the student comprehensively, but expediently, so that we reduce the time they are out of the classroom while facilitating their ability to function optimally and be ready to learn.



From the School Nurse (con't).....

MEDICATION GUIDELINES:



The responsibility for administering student medication rests solely with the parents, or guardian, therefore a schedule should be arranged so that all medication is taken at home under parental supervision and not during school hours whenever possible. In exceptional cases, when medication must be taken during the school day, the regulations from the Illinois Department of Public Health, "Guidelines for Management of Medication in the Schools" will be implemented by the Certified School Nurse as follows:



Procedures:

1. The school nurse is to be informed of students who are receiving medication for long-term medical conditions.
2. Whenever possible, medication should be self-administered under the supervision of the school nurse or an administrator.
3. Medication is to be brought to the school in a container which has been appropriately labeled by a pharmacy or a medical provider.
4. When medication must be administered at school, the parent or guardian must provide to the school nurse a District 214 medication request form authorizing the administration of the prescribed medication. This form is available at the school health services office or for download on the district or individual school web site (www.d214.org or eghs.d214.org, click on Parents, Health Services and then Forms). Yearly renewal is required.
5. Tylenol or Acetaminophen can now be administered with parental permission using the on-line registration form.
6. The school nurse and/or the principal may, at their discretion, reject a request for administration of a medication. It is understood that the school district provides this service in the interest of the well-being of students and as an accommodation to parents.

Developed by: District 214 Advisory Committee as mandated by state law (P.A. 86-1441). The members of this committee are representatives of District 214 administrators, school nurses, teacher-trainers, community physicians, nurses and parents.

ASTHMA INHALER/EPI PEN POLICY: Asthma Inhaler/Epi-Pen Policy

In accordance with 105ILCS 5/22-30 and District 214 Medication Policy, students may carry and self-administer asthma medication or their prescribed Epi-Pen at school. An Asthma Inhaler/Epi-Pen Request form needs to be completed yearly and must be signed by the student's medical provider. This form can also be obtained in the school health office or on the school or district website. Each student should carry his/her inhaler/Epi-Pen in its original pharmacy labeled container with the student's name, the drug name and exact dosage as well as the indication or time in which the medication should be taken. As with any medication, neither inhalers nor Epi-Pens should be shared with other students.

Dear Parent/Guardian,

Immunization Requirement for the 2020-2021 School Year:

For the 2020-2021 school year, **all students entering 12th grade shall show proof of having received two doses of MENINGOCOCCAL CONJUGATE VACCINE (Menactra, Menveo, MCV4) prior to starting school.** The first dose should have been administered on or after their 11th birthday and the second dose on or after their 16th birthday. An interval of at least eight weeks between the first and second dose is required. **Only one dose of the vaccine is required if the first dose is administered when the child is 16 years of age or older. You do not have to wait until your child is going into 12th grade to get the 2nd dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine - once your child turns 16 years-old they are eligible to receive it.**

Your child may have already received both doses of the required Meningococcal Conjugate Vaccine, however we may not have received proof that they were given. Please check with your child’s medical provider to determine if they received the two Meningococcal Conjugate Vaccines and, if they were given, please ask that they complete all information indicated below, including their signature and office stamp. **If your child has not received both doses, you are required to get this vaccination for your child or your child will be subject to exclusion as described in the school code of Illinois.**

Your child will not be able to receive their class schedule or attend school in August until all immunizations are up to date.

Please submit this completed form or an updated immunization record to the Health Office at Elk Grove High School as soon as possible.

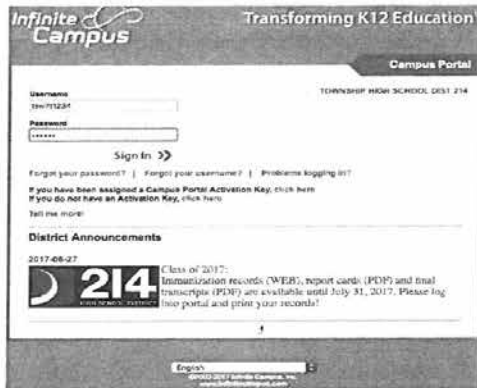

ASBESTOS HAZARD EMERGENCY RESPONSE ACT

In accordance with the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) and the Illinois Asbestos Abatement Act (105 ILCS 105/), you are being notified that all District 214 facilities contain various amounts and types of asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM). These materials do not pose any hazard to individuals unless the materials are disturbed.

The District maintains compliance with all applicable governmental and regulatory asbestos rules and regulations. The District also maintains compliance with the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) and Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) guidelines for operations and maintenance activities. The District routinely performs operations and maintenance activities, required inspections, and surveillance activities to verify that the materials are being managed according to IDPH and CCDPH guidelines.

The Building and Grounds Department of each individual facility and the District Operations Department have on file copies of the AHERA Management Plans that describe the locations of all ACBM. These Plans are available for inspection during regular business hours. Contact the Director of Operations for more information at (847) 718-7619.

PESTICIDE APPLICATION NOTIFICATION REGISTRY

All District 214 facilities practice Integrated Pest Management to minimize the use of any pesticides on school grounds. The Structural Pest Control Act (225 ILCS 235/) and the Lawn Care Products Application and Notice Act (415 ILCS 65/) requires public schools to notify parents/guardians and school employees at least 48 hours (two business days) prior to any pesticide applications on school grounds. The term “pesticide” includes insecticides, herbicides, rodenticides and fungicides. The notification requirement extends to both indoor and outdoor pesticide applications. Excluded from the notification requirement are antimicrobials such as disinfectants, sanitizers or deodorizers, insecticide baits and rodenticide baits.

Pesticide application notification can be included in newsletters, bulletins, calendars and/or other correspondence currently published by each school and the District. All District 214 facilities have established a registry of individuals who wish to be specifically notified of pesticide applications on school grounds. To be included in this registry, please contact your student’s individual school or program for more information.

Dear Parent/Guardian and Staff Members:

In 1999 the Illinois General Assembly passed laws requiring that public schools notify parents/guardians and school employees at least 48 hours prior to any pesticide applications on school property. The term "pesticide" includes insecticides, herbicides, rodenticides, and fungicides. The notification requirement extends to both indoor and outdoor pesticide applications. Excluded from the notification requirement are antimicrobial agents (such as disinfectants, sanitizers, or deodorizers), insecticide baits, and rodenticide baits.

Elk Grove High School has therefore established a registry of people who wish to be notified. Bosch Scholarships Help Students Discover Futures in the Trades

Six District 214 seniors have earned \$2,500 each through the Blueprint Bosch Vocational Scholarship to pay for postsecondary education and training in the trades. The scholarships are aimed at helping student’s complete certification courses in areas such as welding, HVAC, plumbing, machining, automotive technology and carpentry. The Bosch Community Fund generously pledged a total of \$45,000 to District 214 over three years to fund the award.

This year’s recipients are Marc Alejandro of Buffalo Grove High School; Alexis Castrejon of Rolling Meadows High School; Kevin Holm of Rolling Meadows High School; Thomas Malen of Prospect High School; Jose Torres of Rolling Meadows High School; and Philip Wozniak of John Hersey High School.

Marc, who will attend Illinois State University to study construction management, says the scholarship will allow him to focus more on his college studies with less pressure on repaying college loans. Alexis is aiming for an automotive career. Having completed courses in auto systems and diagnostic testing and repair, his next stop is Triton College, where he will take a two-year GM automotive program. Kevin plans to study automotive engineering technology for two years at Triton College before attending Ferris State University in Michigan. At Rolling Meadows, he prepared by taking auto systems and participating in Auto Club. Thomas’s career goals focus on heavy equipment, an objective he will advance by attending Illinois Central College, which has a partnership with Caterpillar. The program consists of two years of study, enhanced by internships. Jose will attend Harper College to study and

prepare for a career in either construction or manufacturing because that, as he explained, “is what I love to do. I love to build and get my hands dirty on a project.” Philip’s focus is construction, with the ambitious goal of earning licenses in plumbing, electrical and carpentry. He plans to complete a certificate program through Harper and Triton colleges, focusing on business and construction technology.

The scholarship asks applicants to discuss their career goals and inspiration, and requests they talk about a time they gave back – an area of importance at Bosch. The scholarship was the first of its kind regionally when it launched last year, offering an opportunity for students in the trades to progress more easily through college.

“We are so grateful to Bosch for this commitment to funding the future for our students,” said Erin Holmes, executive director of the District 214 Education Foundation, which created the scholarship with Bosch and oversees the funding. “Our students all have different dreams and different goals, and opportunities like this ensure each is prepared for success.”

The District 214 Education Foundation has awarded nearly \$65,000 – more than ever before – to new District 214 graduates to help them succeed in college and careers after high school.

These collaborative experiences provide students the chance to gain valuable insights.

Opportunities Remain for Student Apprenticeships

High School District 214's commitment to providing work-based learning experiences that prepare students for success after graduation takes many forms – none more rigorous or directly relevant to future work than the apprenticeship program. And while COVID-19 upset many existing norms, it did not prevent District 214's first cohort of apprentices from successfully completing their work.

Four graduating seniors - Cesar Diaz, Edin Hodzic, Jovany Melchor and Bob Voss – become the first group of District 214 seniors to complete the Youth Apprenticeship program, giving each a major boost toward meeting their career goals. Hodzic, of Elk Grove High School; Melchor, of John Hersey High School; and Voss, of Rolling Meadows High School, will be moving on to further studies and training in cybersecurity. Cesar, of Rolling Meadows, will be working in HVAC.

Some students simply know with certainty the path they want to follow. Realizing this, District 214 developed the apprenticeship program to provide concrete job skills, training and certification opportunities students who by the end of their junior year are certain what they wish to pursue.

The program is rigorous. Once apprentices are selected, they engage in approximately 15 hours per week of on-the-job training, in addition to college coursework and mentoring. College partners include Moraine Valley Community College for apprentices going into cybersecurity and Harper College for HVAC.

During the summer, apprentices work up to 28 hours a week to expand their skills. At the end of the program, students receive either a federally registered apprenticeship certification or a youth apprenticeship certification in addition to up to a year of college credits. The second cohort of apprentices has already begun their work, and recruitment of students and business partners for a third cohort is now underway. Any business interested in learning more may contact Partnership Manager, Kathy Wicks (kathy.wicks@d214.org).

The value of extensive training and guidance while still in high school is not lost on the apprentices. "The experience that I have gained as an apprentice gave me a clear insight of what the industry looks like," Hodzic says. "Being able to work within the industry while going to school was great and rewarding. I was able to learn new skills that will help me move forward within this field." Melchor added: "This program was not just a list of requirements to be completed. Instead, it facilitated us to think and explore this industry. I am more than grateful to have had this experience my senior year of high school because I will definitely always remember what I've learned from it."

Approximately 25% of the FY20 English as a Second Language (ESL) program is paid with federal funds in the amount of \$63,420.

Approximately 24% of the FY20 Family Literacy program and The Catherine M. Lee Women's and Children's Center are paid with federal funds in the amount of \$37,174. The project is made possible by a grant awarded by the IL State Library (ISL), a division of the Office of the Secretary of State, using funds designated for literacy.

Approximately 79% of the FY20 High School Equivalency program was paid with federal funds in the amount of \$49,636.

Approximately 13% of the FY20 Read to Learn program was paid with federal funds in the amount of \$22,873. The program is made possible by a grant awarded by the IL State Library (ISL), a division of the Office of the Secretary of State, using funds designated for literacy. Approximately \$9,500 of this program is supported with non-government sources.

Approximately 99% of the FY20 Reading 101 (Evidence-Based Reading Instruction - EBRI) program was paid with federal funds in the amount of \$12,607.

100% of the FY20 College and Career Ready program was paid with federal funds in the amount of \$10,392.

No federal funds support the U.S. Citizenship Preparation, Spanish GED or the Manufacturing Pathway program in FY20.
