Planning a College Visit

Arrange a Visit:

Decide which college(s) you want to visit. If you are going far away, can you go to multiple colleges of interest at one time?
Review college website, any brochures, or additional information you have on the school. Talk to teachers, college counselor, or school counselor to gather information they might know about the college. Ask yourself, is this college a good fit for me?
Decide on dates you are available to visit the college. Things to consider: homework, athletic schedule, parent / guardian schedule, work schedule, etc.
Think about transportation (drive, bus, train?). How will you make it to the college on time for your visit?
Visit college website. Typically under "Admission" tab you will find "Visit campus." Read this page to determine best way to contract school.
Contact school. Call, email, or fill out a survey to express your interest in visiting their campus
Write date down in calendar
Confirm visit a couple days in advance. Ask any follow up questions such as: How long tour will be? What other activities are available to me while I am on campus?

Get Ready

	Explore the college's website and review materials that you have about the college. Write down any specific questions you have for the college.			
	Make a list of questions to ask admissions representative, financial aid representative, students, or staff you encounter. See below OR <u>Campus Visit Checklist</u>			
Schedule time to walk through campus by yourself (if you can)				
	Pack a college comparison sheet (see below) OR <u>Campus Visit Scorecard</u> , notebook, camera (phone),			
	Print map- locate buildings or placed you want to visit (ex: gym, library, theater, dining hall, sports arena). Fine where admissions office is.			
	Make travel/ Hotel Arrangements			
	Last Resort: Absolute cannot make it on campus? See if they offer a virtual tour			

Things to schedule:

**An informational session
**A campus tour
**Meet with an admissions counselor
Attend a class
Request to see a dorm - sometimes seen during tour
Meet with a professor
Meet with a financial aid representative
Eat in the dining hall
Spend a night at the dorm
Club leaders- find the club contact person and schedule time to talk with them
Athlete- schedule time to talk with coaches

During the visit:

Walk around public areas		
Attend a club meeting or sports practice / event		
Write notes, take pictures to help you remember your visit		
Pick up a free college newspaper		
Pick up financial aid forms		
Walk or drive through the town		
Talk to a current student		

After the visit:

Follow up your visit with a thank you note to the college representatives whom you've met.
Talk to somebody about your college visit. Reflect on how the visit went for you
Ask yourself. Can I picture myself here?
